SUBJECT: 2025 Legislative Session Update – Week 9

The legislature concluded its policy work on Friday, May 2nd. However, legislators must come back to complete their only constitutional duty... to pass a state budget before July 1, 2025. Late Friday evening, the legislature passed [HCR 1631](#), a concurrent resolution extending the 2025 Regular Session of the Florida Legislature until 11:59 p.m. on Friday, June 6, 2025. During this extended period, only the budget, the budget conforming bills, and the tax package will be considered.

Property Tax Committee

The Florida House of Representatives [announced](#) the creation of the [Select Committee on Property Taxes](#), aiming to develop tax relief proposals for homeowners. The select committee is Co-chaired by Rep. Toby Overdorf (R-Stuart) and Rep. Vicki Lopez (R-Miami) and will examine reforms to ease the rising cost of homeownership across Florida. Proposals under review include referendums on eliminating homestead property taxes, new homestead exemptions up to \$1 million for longtime and senior residents, broader legislative authority to expand exemptions, and changes to assessment caps on property value increases. The committee may also seek to prohibit foreclosure due to unpaid property tax liens, emphasizing homeowner protection. The Select Committee on Property Taxes held its first organizational meeting on [Friday, May 2](#).

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Legislation of Interest (listed alphabetically)

Actions for Recovery of Damages for Wrongful Death – [HB 6017](#) by Rep. Dana Trabulsy (R-Fort Peirce) removes the prohibition on recovery of noneconomic wrongful death damages in medical negligence cases by the decedent's children who are 25 years of age or older and parents of a deceased child who was 25 years of age or older at the time of death.

HB 6017 was approved by the House 104-6, was approved by the Senate 33-4 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take effect July 1, 2025.

Administration of Controlled Substances by Paramedics - [HB 519](#) by Rep. Robin Bartleman (D-Weston) allows paramedics, under direction and supervision, to administer a controlled substance in the course of providing emergency services.

CS/HB 519 was approved by the House 108-0, was approved by the Senate 37-0 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take effect upon becoming a law.

Anaphylaxis in Public Schools - [SB 1514](#) by Sen. Carlos Guillermo Smith (D-Orlando) requires each school that serves students in kindergarten through grade 8 to provide training to an adequate number of school personnel and contracted personnel in preventing and responding to allergic reactions, including anaphylaxis. The bill also requires that for each student in kindergarten through grade 8 who has an emergency action plan for anaphylaxis, such plan must be in effect and accessible at all times when the student is on school grounds during the school day or participating in school-sponsored activities.

CS/CS/SB 1514 was approved by the Senate 37-0, was approved by the House 113-0 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take effect July 1, 2025.

Automated External Defibrillators on School Grounds - [HB 1607](#) by Rep. Taylor Yarkosky (R-Clermont) requires school districts to provide basic training in first aid and requires public schools to have at least one automated external defibrillator on school grounds.

CS/HB 1607 was approved by the House 113-0, was approved by the Senate 37-0 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take effect July 1, 2025.

Breast Cancer – State Group Insurance Program Coverage for Diagnostic and Supplemental Breast Examinations – [SB 158](#) by Sen. Lori Berman (D-Boynton Beach) prohibits the state group insurance program from imposing enrollee cost-sharing liability for diagnostic breast examinations and supplemental breast examinations.

SB 158 was approved by the Senate, 38-0, was approval by the House 116-0 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take effect January 1, 2026.

Child Care and Early Learning Providers – [SB 738](#) by Sen. Colleen Burton (R-Winter Haven) directs the Department of Children and Families (DCF) to create minimum standards for the licensure of child care facilities and revises several requirements. The bill also repeals statute which requires child care facilities to provide the following information: (1) the causes, symptoms and transmission of the influenza virus; and (2) potential for distracted adults to forget a child in the back seat of a car.

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CS/SB 738 was approved by the Senate 37-0, was approved by the House 114-0 on Wednesday, 4/30 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take effect July 1, 2025.

Children with Developmental Disabilities - [SB 112](#) by Sen. Gayle Harrell (R-Stuart) expands services and funding opportunities for children with autism spectrum disorder and other developmental disabilities.

CS/CS/SB 112 was approved by the Senate, 38-0, was approved by the House 113-0 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take effect upon becoming a law.

Children's Medical Services Program - [SB 1490](#) by Sen. Gayle Harrell (R-Stuart) transfers the operation of Children's Medical Services Managed Care Plan from DOH to AHCA effective July 1, 2025. The DOH will retain responsibilities for clinical eligibility determination and provide ongoing consultation to ACHA on services. The bill also requires AHCA to redesign the Medicaid model waiver to include tier services for private duty nursing services.

CS/CS/ SB 1490 was approved by the Senate 37-0, was approved by the House 112-0 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take upon becoming a law.

Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services –and [SB 700](#) by Sen. Keith Truenow (R-Tavares) is a comprehensive agriculture bill that includes a water quality provision that would prevent the use of certain additives (eg fluoride) in a water system which do not meet the definition of water quality additive.

CS/CS/CS/SB 700 was approved by the Senate 27-9, was approved by the House 88-27 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take effect on July 1, 2025.

Department of Health – [HB 1299](#) by Rep. Taylor Yarkosky (R-Clermont) saves the definition of “messenger ribonucleic and vaccine” from repeal, requires additional reporting of medical marijuana treatment centers and medical marijuana testing laboratories, defines the term “party state” in the Physical Therapy Compact, and amends the Mobile Opportunity by Interstate License Endorsement Act to reduce from 3 to 2 years the required timeframe of active practice for licensure by endorsement.

CS/CS/CS/HB 1299 was approved by the Senate 37-0, was approved by the House 113-0 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take effect on July 1, 2025.

Diabetes Management In Schools - [HB 597](#) by Rep. Toby Overdorf (R-Stuart) authorizes school districts or charter schools to acquire and maintain a supply of undesignated glucagon to treat students with diabetes who experience a hypoglycemic emergency.

CS/CS/CS/HB 597 was approved by the Governor and takes effect July 1, 2025.

Electrocardiograms for Student Athletes – [SB 1070](#) by Sen. Corey Simon (R-Tallahassee) requires certain students to receive electrocardiograms to participate in interscholastic athletic competition unless the parent objects in writing based on religious tenets or secures a certificate of medical exemption.

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CS/CS/CS/SB 1070 was approved by the House 110-0, was approved by the Senate 37-0 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take effect on July 1, 2025.

Florida Institute for Pediatric Rare Diseases - [HB 907](#) by Rep. Adam Anderson (R-Tarpon Springs) establishes the Florida Institute for Pediatric Rare Diseases within FSU College of Medicine, The Sunshine Genetics Pilot Program and The Sunshine Genetics Consortium.

CS/CS/HB 907 was approved by the House 116-0, was approved by the Senate 37-0 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take effect on July 1, 2025.

Harming or Neglecting Children – [SB 1286](#) by Sen. Erin Grall (R-Fort Pierce) amends the definition of harm and neglect of a child in chapter 39, F.S., to allow caregivers to let a sufficiently mature child partake in independent, unsupervised activities without considering these actions as harm or neglect of a child.

SB 1286 was approved by the Senate 36-0, was approved by the House 116-0 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take effect on July 1, 2025.

Health Coverage by Nonprofit Agricultural Organizations - [SB 480](#) by Sen. Nick DiCeglie (R-St. Petersburg) authorizes nonprofit agricultural organizations to offer health coverage to their members and provide that such health coverage is not insurance for purposes of Florida Insurance Code.

CS/CS/SB 480 was approved by the Senate 32-4, was approved by the House 114-0 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take effect on July 1, 2025.

Health Facilities Authorities – [SB 68](#) by Sen. Jonathan Martin (R-Fort Myers) expands the types of health facility corporate structures authorized to pursue financing from a Health Facilities Authority (HFA), and expands the types of financial activities HFAs may engage in for the benefit of health care facilities and providers.

CS/SB 68 was approved by the Senate 36-0, was approved by the House 113-0 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take effect July 1, 2025.

Home Health Aide for Medically Fragile Children Program - [SB 1156](#) by Sen Gayle Harrell (R-Stuart) provides requirements for the annual assessment of the home health aide for medically fragile children program, revises the utilization cap of a Medicaid fee schedule, requires a home health aide for medically fragile children who works more than 40 hours per week to provide specified justification, requires the agency to seek federal approval to exclude from the family's Medicaid income any income earned through employment as a home health aide for their medically fragile child.

CS/CS/SB 1156 was approved by the Senate 37-0, was approved by the House 113-0 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take effect upon becoming a law.

Home Health Care Services - [HB 1353](#) by Rep. Gallop Franklin (D-Tallahassee) revises provisions relating to administrator management, removes requirements that certain home health agencies provide specified services, and revises Excellence in Home Health Program criteria requirements.

CS/HB 1353 was approved by the House 115-0, was approved by the Senate 37-0 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take effect July 1, 2025

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Improving Screening for and Treatment of Blood Clots - [HB 1421](#) by Rep. Dean Black (R-Jacksonville) requires the DOH to contract with a private entity to create and maintain a statewide venous thromboembolism registry, requires the AHCA to submit a report to the Governor and the Legislature on the incidence of venous thromboembolisms using inpatient and outpatient data, requires all hospitals with emergency departments and ambulatory surgical centers to develop and implement policies and procedures for the rendering of appropriate medical attention for persons at risk of forming venous thromboembolisms, requires hospitals and ambulatory surgical centers to train nonphysician personnel on their policies and procedures and requires ALFs to provide consumer information pamphlets to residents containing certain information about venous thromboembolisms.

CS/CS/CS/HB 1421 was approved by the House 110-0, was approved by the Senate 36-0 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take effect on July 1, 2025.

Licensure of Family Foster Homes - [HB 989](#) by Rep. Gallop Franklin (D-Tallahassee) requires DCF to adopt rules which allow a family foster home licensee in good standing, when he or she relocates within the state and submits an updated application, to benefit from priority review, an expedited home study, expedited background checks, and recognition of previously completed foster parent training coursework.

CS/CS/HB 899 was approved by the House 111-0, was approved by the Senate 37-0 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take effect on October 1, 2025.

Medical Debt - [HB 547](#) by Rep. Bill Partington (R-Daytona Beach) provides an exception to the requirement that hospitals and ambulatory surgical centers provide 30 days' notice to consumers before selling their debt. The exception applies if the facility and the medical debt buyer have a contract that states the debt will not be subject to interest, fees, or other extraordinary collection actions, and the debt buyer will return the debt to the licensed facility if it finds the debt qualifies for the facility's charity care program. The bill also clarifies that the regulatory requirements for medical debt held by hospitals and ambulatory surgical centers apply to all bills for payment, not only those covered under the facility's financial assistance program.

CS/HB 547 was approved by the House 116-0, was approved by the Senate 38-0 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take effect on July 1, 2025.

Mental Health - [SB 168](#) by Sen. Jennifer Bradley (R-Flemming Island) creates the "Tristin Murphy Act" aimed to add alternative pathways for prosecuting defendants with mental illness. The bill encourages communities to apply for grants to establish pretrial felony mental health diversion programs and expands eligibility for the Forensic Hospital Diversion Pilot Program to include Hillsborough County.

CS/CS/SB 168 was approved by the House 99-0, was approved by the Senate 37-0 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take effect on October 1, 2025.

Mental Health and Substance Use Disorders - [SB 1620](#) by Sen. Darryl Rouson (D-St. Petersburg) implements several recommendations made by the Commission on Mental Health and Substance Use Disorder. The Legislature established the Commission after the 2018 tragedy at Marjory

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Stoneman Douglas High School, tasking it with making recommendations to improve Florida's behavioral health system.

CS/CS/SB 1620 was approved by the House 116-0, was approved by the Senate 34-3 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take effect on July 1, 2025.

Middle School and High School Start Times – [SB 296](#) by Sen. Jennifer Bradley (R-Fleming Island) and Sen. Clay Yarborough (R-Jacksonville) allows school districts and charter schools to meet the requirement that instructional days for middle schools may not begin before 8:00am and high schools may not begin earlier than 8:30am by submitting a report to the Department of Education. **CS/CS/SB 296 was approved by the Senate 38-0 on Thursday, was approved the House 116-0 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take effect on July 1, 2025.**

Newborn Screenings - [HB 1089](#) by Rep. Erika Booth (R-Orlando) requires, subject to appropriation, for every newborn in the state to be screened for Duchenne muscular dystrophy beginning January 1, 2027.

CS/CS/HB 1089 was approved by the House 115-0, was approved by the Senate 36-0 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take effect on July 1, 2025.

Offenses Involving Children – [HB 777](#) by Rep. Rachel Saunders Plakon (R-Longwood) provides that ignorance of victim's age, misrepresentation of victim's age, and bona fide belief concerning victim's age are not defenses to certain offenses in which victim's age is an element of offense. **CS/HB 777 was approved by the Senate 37-0, was approved by the House 111-0 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take effect on October 1, 2025.**

Parkinson's Disease Research Funding - [HB 1545](#) by Rep. Demi Busatta (R-Coral Gables) establishes within the University of South Florida the Consortium for Parkinson's Disease Research, which shall consist of public and private universities and academic medical centers. The bill also establishes the Florida Institute for Parkinson's Disease within the University of South Florida as a statewide resource for Parkinson's disease research and clinical care.

CS/CS/HB 1545 was approved by the House, 112-0, was approved by the Senate, 38-0 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take effect on July 1, 2025.

Physician Assistant and Advanced Practice Registered Nurse Services - [HB 647](#) by Rep. Dana Trabulsy (R-Fort Pierce) authorizes advanced practice registered nurses under a physician protocol to provide specified care to hospice patients.

CS/HB 647 was approved by the House 111-0, was approved by the Senate 38-0 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take effect on July 1, 2025.

Public Education and Background Screening Requirements - [HB 531](#) by Rep. Christine Hunschofsky (D-Coconut Creek) requires ACHA to develop and maintain a publicly available webpage which provides a central source for care provider background screening education and awareness.

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CS/CS/HB 531 was approved by the House 107-0, was approved by the Senate 36-0 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take effect on July 1, 2025.

Refund of Overpayments Made by Patients – [SB 1808](#) by Sen. Colleen Burton (R-Winter Haven) ; requires health care practitioners and health facilities to refund to the patient any overpayment no later than 30 days after the date that the health care practitioner or facility determines that such overpayment was made, specifies licensees who violate certain provisions are subject to administrative fines, requires health care practitioners to refund to the patient any overpayment within a specified timeframe, and revises the list of acts that constitute grounds for disciplinary actions for health care practitioners.

CS/CS/SB 1808 was approved by the Senate 37-0, was approved by the House 112-0 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take effect on January 1, 2026.

Reporting of Student Mental Health Outcomes [HB 969](#) by Rep. Hillary Cassel (R-Hollywood) requires the Office of Program Policy Analysis and Government to evaluate mental health services provided to students by school districts and to provide an initial and final evaluation by December 1, 2025, and December 1, 2026, respectively, to the Governor and Legislature.

CS/CS/HB 969 was approved by the House 106-1, was approved by the Senate 37-0 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take effect upon becoming a law.

Spectrum Alert – [HB 711](#) by Rep. David Borrero (R-Doral) requires the Department of Law Enforcement, in cooperation with the Department of Transportation, the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles, the Department of the Lottery, and local law enforcement agencies, to establish and implement the Spectrum Alert for missing children with autism spectrum disorder which is compatible with existing alert systems.

CS/CS/SB 1768 was approved by the House 99-0, was approved by the Senate 37-0 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take effect on July 1, 2025.

Stem Cell Therapy - [SB 1768](#) by Sen Jay Trumbull (R-Panama City) authorizes physicians to perform stem cell therapies that have not been approved by the FDA for orthopedics, wound care, and pain management. The bill establishes the type of stem cells that may be used, the type of facilities from which a physician may obtain stem cells as well as notice and informed consent requirements.

CS/CS/SB 1768 was approved by the House 112-0, was approved by the Senate 37-0 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take effect on July 1, 2025.

Substance Abuse and Mental Health Care - [HB 1091](#) by Rep. Karen Gonzalez Pittman (R-Tampa) Provides that a facility may retain a patient under involuntary examination for the remainders of the 72-hour examination period notwithstanding transfer requirements if the patient continues to meet criteria, defines term "988 suicide & crisis lifeline call center," requires DCF to authorize and provide oversight of 988 suicide and crisis lifeline call centers and adopt specified rules, remove requirements relating to providers of medication-assisted treatment services for opiate addiction, revise training requirements for mental health professionals, requires court appointed experts to have completed initial and annual forensic evaluator training, and provides requirements for expert to determine acceptable treatments available in the community.

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CS/CS/HB 1091 was approved by the House 112-0, was approved by the Senate 37-0 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take effect on July 1, 2025.

Surrendered Infants - [HB 791](#) by Rep. Nan Cobb (R-Eustis) authorizes hospitals, EMS stations, and fire stations that are staffed 24 hours per day to use infant safety devices to accept surrendered infants establishes criteria for their use.

CS/CS/HB 791 was approved by the Governor and takes effect July 1, 2025.

Type 1 Diabetes Early Detection Program - [SB 958](#) by Sen. Mack Bernard (D-West Palm Beach) requires DOH, in collaboration with school districts throughout state, to develop informational materials for early detection of Type 1 diabetes for parents & guardians of students. The bill also provides requirements for such informational materials and requires early learning coalitions to notify parents & guardians of the availability of informational materials for the early detection of Type 1 diabetes.

CS/CS/SB 958 was approved by the Senate, 37-0, was approved by the House 115-0 and next goes to the Governor for consideration. If approved, the act will take effect July 1, 2025.
